MAKING MUSIC MAGICAL

Mastery of an instrument takes time, dedication and hard work. In an age when we all expect instant gratification, it can sometimes be hard to keep children motivated, but there are a few things parents can do to keep the magic alive.



As parents we all live busy lives, but simply taking a few minutes each day to listen to and praise your child's musical achievements can make a huge difference. Remember that praise needs to be genuine, but for many, it is the fact that a parent is taking an interest that makes it special. When we send our children away to "go and practice" it sends quite a different message. – Try "come and play to me!"

Encourage multimedia use and let your child enjoy taking their music into the electronic world. Think about asking your child to make their own music video. Even if it is just recorded on a cellphone, PC and Mac both have simple editing software that can turn it into something special. Imagine how proud your child would be to give a DVD of their very own performance to friends, family or teachers for Christmas!

A good quality instrument adds a huge amount of value. When the music sounds great, it can be really motivating. If a student though is struggling with an out of tune instrument with a nasty tone, it is easy to lose interest. Remember also that often for kids it comes down to how cool the instrument looks. Many music shops offer guitars, ukuleles, and even wind and brass instruments in bright colours that really catch the eye.

Exposing your child to a wide variety of music is also so important. Furthermore, allowing them to experience music live is essential. Do you remember your excitement the first time you went to a big concert or professional theatre show? Nothing beats the atmosphere of being in an audience and being immersed in a magical musical world.

Finally, and perhaps most importantly, allow your child to experiment and explore making music of their own. Yes – of course we want to see students practice for their exams or concerts, but allowing them to expand their own musical horizons really helps keep the magic happening.

Music is a skill for life. And when a child can carry a love for making music into adulthood and then retirement – that is truly magical!

November is often a busy month for our students sitting external music exams.


We wish all of our students sitting exams the very best of luck.
